Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Window Fixes

For those excited to roll up their sleeves, here are three common window repair work that many homeowners can take on.

1. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty windows are frequently the outcome of flattened or missing weatherstripping.

- **Action 1:** Clean the window channel completely to remove dirt and old adhesive.
- **Action 2:** Measure the perimeter of the window sash.
- **Action 3:** Cut the brand-new weatherstripping (V-strip, foam tape, or felt) to size.
- **Step 4:** Peel and stick (or staple, depending on the material) the weatherstripping into place, guaranteeing a tight seal when the window closes.

2. Fixing a Stuck Window

- **Step 3:** Once the window moves, raise it and clear out any dirt or particles from the tracks.
- **Step 4:** Apply a silicone-based lube or paraffin wax to the tracks for smooth future operation.

3. Replacing a Cracked Single-Pane Window

If a single pane of glass breaks, it can be changed without purchasing a whole brand-new window unit.

- **Step 1:** Put on sturdy work gloves and security glasses. Thoroughly get rid of all damaged glass shards from the frame.
- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and remove the metal sparkles holding the glass in location.
- **Action 3:** Measure the opening and cut a new piece of glass (or have a hardware shop cut it) somewhat smaller sized than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, protect it with new glazing points, and apply a bevel of putty around the outside edge. Paint as soon as dry.

Preventive Maintenance: How to Make Your Windows Last

The very best window repair is the one you never have to make. Regular maintenance can dramatically extend the life-span of windows:

- **Clean Regularly:** Wipe down tracks, frames, and glass a minimum of two times a year to avoid dirt accumulation that causes jams.
- **Check Caulking:** Check the exterior caulk around the window frames yearly. Reapply exterior-grade silicone caulk if gaps or fractures appear.
- **Lube Moving Parts:** Apply a light lube to hinges, locks, and sliding tracks as soon as a year.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Use dehumidifiers in damp locations like basements to prevent condensation and subsequent wood rot.

- **Vinyl windows:** 20 to 40 years.
- **Wood windows:** 30 to 50+ years (with appropriate upkeep).
- **Aluminum windows:** 20 to 25 years.
- **Fiberglass windows:** 50+ years.
