



A pest problem at home rarely starts as a dramatic event. More often, it begins with a faint scratching sound behind a wall on a cold night, a trail of ants that appears near the sink every morning, or a wasp circling the same corner of the eaves for three days in a row. By the time most homeowners notice a pattern, the issue has usually been building for weeks, sometimes months.

Termites are less visible but often more financially significant. Subterranean termites can remain hidden for a long time, especially in homes with finished basements or cluttered storage areas that limit inspection visibility. A homeowner may first notice a soft baseboard, blistered paint, or faint mud tubes near the foundation. Since damage progresses out of sight, periodic inspection is critical, particularly for homes with previous moisture issues or wood-to-soil contact.

Stinging insects create a different kind of urgency. Wasps and hornets around entryways, decks, rooflines, and play areas are not just irritating. The mistake many homeowners make is trying to knock down a nest at the wrong time of day or with an over-the-counter product that agitates the colony without eliminating it. Mosquitoes and ticks deserve their own mention because they affect how people use their property. A backyard should be a place to relax, not a zone you avoid after 5 p.m. Seasonal mosquito treatments can make a noticeable difference, but they work best when paired with habitat reduction such as managing standing water, trimming dense shade pockets, and addressing clogged gutters. Tick pressure often rises around wooded edges, stone walls, ornamental grasses, and leaf litter. A yard treatment can help, but property maintenance and family habits are part of the equation too.

Older homes, newer homes, and the hidden vulnerabilities in each
