

Mt. Sinai does not try to impress you with spectacle, and that is part of its appeal. It is a North Shore hamlet that feels lived in rather than staged, a place where the land still does much of the talking. The shoreline is rugged in spots, the streets are lined with a mix of older homes and newer construction, and the local rhythm reflects a community that has grown carefully instead of rushing to reinvent itself.
