paint is noticeably chipped and dull in major locations. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavy wear. The weapon looks heavily weathered, rusted, or battered. (Note: Some skins look distinctively "cool" or "blacked-out" in high float BS).

It deserves noting that some skins are hardcoded to never appear in certain conditions. For instance, a specific skin may just exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic weapon surfaces.
