

Bay Shore has a way of making a weekend feel fuller than it should. It is close enough to New York City to be convenient, but it still keeps the pace and texture of a true South Shore village. You can spend a morning on tree-lined streets with older homes and storefronts, take an afternoon walk by the water, then finish the day with a good meal and a sunset that seems to linger longer than expected. For a place many people pass through on the way to Fire Island ferries or nearby beach towns, Bay Shore rewards anyone who slows down long enough to notice what is already here.
