

Burlington has never been the kind of town that fits neatly into a postcard cliché. It sits close enough to Boston to feel the pull of the city, yet it still keeps a local rhythm shaped by neighborhood roads, small commercial corridors, school schedules, and the practical concerns that come with New England living.
