



Gum disease rarely announces itself with drama. It starts quietly, with a little bleeding when you floss, a faint metallic taste, gums that look puffy in the mirror, or persistent bad breath that does not match the amount of brushing you do. By the time many people realize something is wrong, the condition has often been active for months or years.
