4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once acquired, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which gamers can purchase, sell, or trade them freely on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike many video games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account permanently, Rust skins have real-world liquidity through the Steam Wallet (and third-party marketplaces, though caution is advised). Rates vary based on supply, demand, and overall gamer count.

Certain rare skins have attained famous status, commanding hundreds and even countless dollars. The economy is driven by shortage; once a weekly shop rotation ends, Facepunch seldom re-releases those specific items, implying the overall supply is permanently capped.
