

If you're spotting a few insects or the random rustle, it can be hard to tell whether you're dealing with a small nuisance or a spreading **infestation**. The clearest way to judge **pest activity** is to compare what you're seeing now with what you saw a week or two ago. Typical signs pests are getting more active

Some early clues are easy to miss if you're only looking for live pests. In many homes, the first clues of escalating pest activity are indirect. These signs often show up before the infestation becomes obvious.

Watch for **chew marks** on food packaging, wood, cardboard, wiring, or soft materials. Rodents and some insects leave visible damage as they feed, move, or build nests. You may also find **nesting materials** such as shredded paper, insulation, fabric, or dried plant matter tucked into quiet corners, storage boxes, or behind appliances.

A further sign is **scratching sounds** in the walls, ceiling, or under floors, especially at night. These noises often mean pests are active in **wall voids**, crawl spaces, or other hidden routes. Other frequent signs include:

- Fresh droppings appearing in new areas.

Put simply, if you're seeing more evidence than actual pests, the pests may be hiding well. If you're seeing both evidence and live activity, the situation is likely worsening.

How to tell if the infestation is spreading to other parts of your home

One of the strongest signs that pest activity is increasing is when it moves beyond to one room. A small issue in the **kitchen** can soon spread to the **basement**, **attic**, or other hidden areas if pests find better shelter and access. This is especially true when they can travel through **wall voids**, utility chases, and small cracks near pipes or vents.

Annual pest changes in Scarborough, ON
