

If you are looking at airline pilot training options and you see an approval identifier like **CH.ATO.0311**, it can feel like a code meant for regulators, not for students. The reality is simpler: for student pilots, an approval number is mostly a shortcut to one very practical question.

“Is this training organization formally authorized to provide the kind of training it advertises?”
