

Milton is one of those South Sound cities that can be easy to pass through without realizing how much is tucked into such a compact place. It sits quietly between larger, busier neighbors, but that quiet has its own appeal. The streets feel lived in rather than staged, the views can open up quickly when you least expect them, and the city carries the kind of practical, working-town history that gives a place character without turning it into a museum piece.
