How emergency lockouts affect pricing

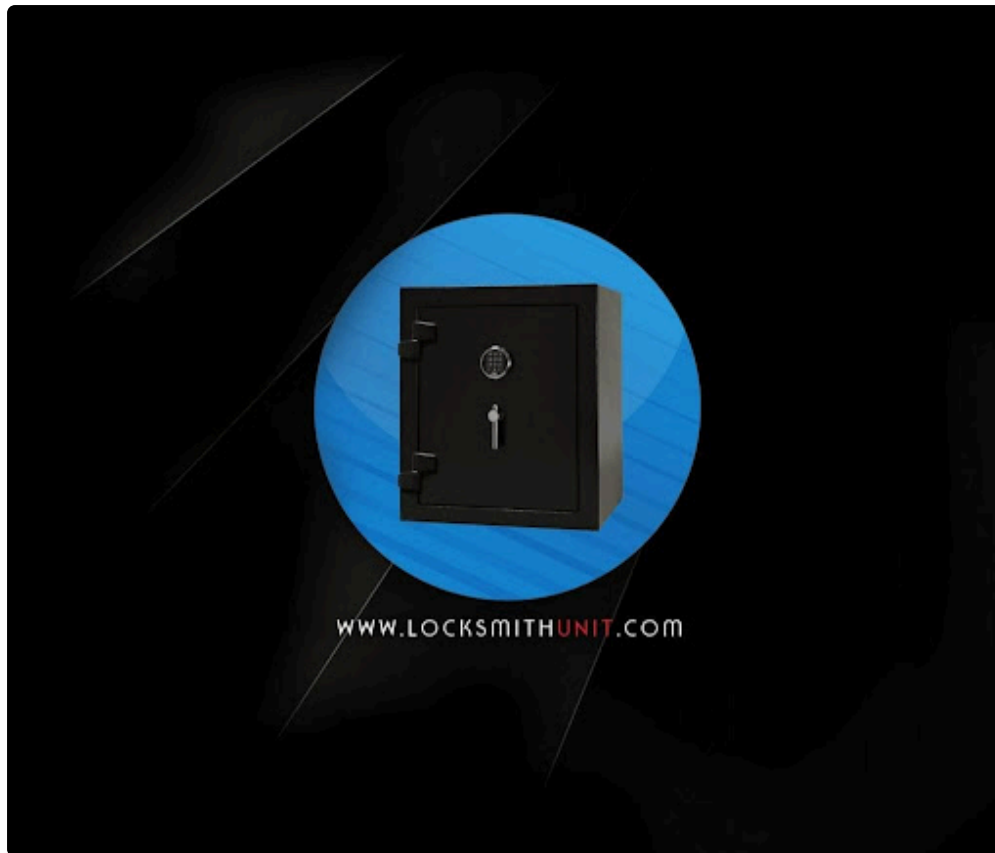
