Normally the most expensive. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Extremely light wear, frequently only obvious upon close assessment. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible scratches and endure prominent edges, but the artwork remains mostly undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear,

heavy scratching, and noticeable fading of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Extremely worn, rusted, or greatly faded. Sometimes demanded for distinct "black-grind" results.
