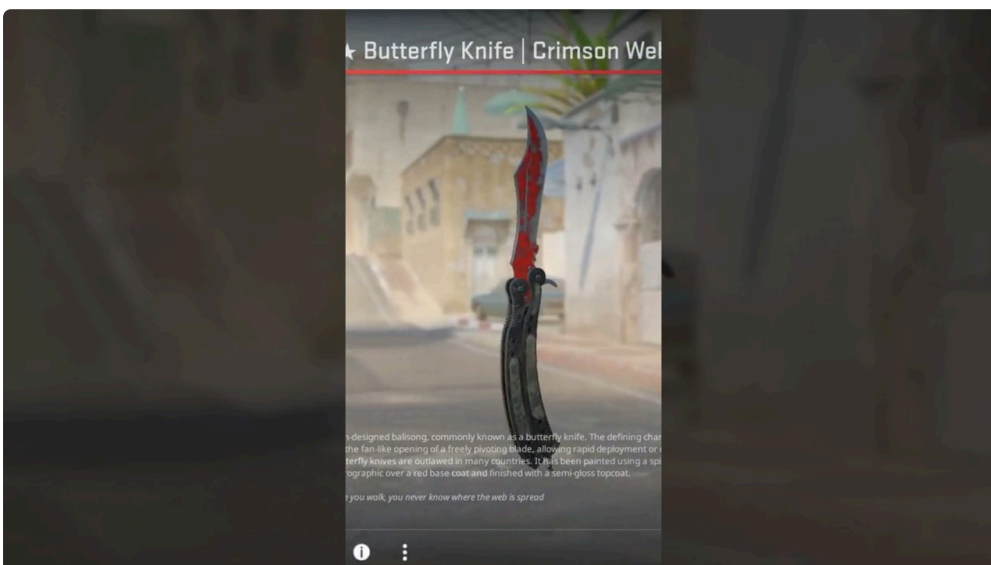
A case's rarity is determined by 3 core aspects:

Leading Rare Cases Every Collector Should Know

- **eSports 2013 Case**-- Released for the 2013 ESL One Katowice tournament. Just a couple of thousand were awarded, and it never returned.
- **eSports 2014 Summer Case**-- Issued throughout the 2014 Summer Majors. Its drop rate was incredibly limited, and it has since become a staple of high-end inventories.

- **Winter Case (2013)**-- Distributed throughout the 2013 Winter Holiday occasion. The case is understood for its distinctive blue-toned artwork and uncommon skin swimming pool.
- **Operation Bravo Case**-- Introduced with Operation Bravo (2013). Although the operation itself is long gone, the case stays accessible only through the Steam Community Market.
- **Operation Phoenix Case**-- Part of Operation Phoenix (2014). It includes an unique set of covert skins and a low drop possibility.
- **Falchion Case**-- While it is a basic weapon case, its preliminary release was connected to a limited-time promo, making early copies scarce.
- **Huntsman Case**-- Launched along with the Huntsman Weapon Collection. The case's drop rate was intentionally lowered after the first week.
- **Revolver Case**-- Released to accompany the Revolver Case weapon set. Its exclusivity originates from the brief window during which it could be earned.
- **Gods and Monsters Case**-- A community-created case that was only offered for a short period in 2015.
- **Chroma 2 Case**-- Though still technically obtainable, its original drop rate was lower than most, and it is thought about "uncommon" by numerous traders.

2. **Third-Party Trading Platforms**-- Sites such as Buff163, Skinport, and Dmarket frequently host listings with slight discount rates. Nevertheless, buyers need to confirm the platform's reputation to prevent scams.
3. **In-Game Drops**-- For cases that still periodically drop (e.g., Chroma 2), players can increase their opportunities by taking part in official Valve operations or by using active servers. The drop rate stays low, so patience is essential.
4. **Occasion Giveaways**-- Occasionally, Valve or partner competitions host free gifts where gamers can win an uncommon case. Watching on main statements and social networks channels ensures chances are not missed.
