### Step-by-Step Fixes for Common Glass Door Issues

#### 1. Fixing a Sliding Glass Door That Drags or Sticks

- **Step 3: Install the New Material**Step the perimeter of the door frame and cut the brand-new weatherstripping to size. Press strongly into place, guaranteeing a tight seal when the door is closed without making it exceedingly tough to lock.
