## Methods for CS2 Case Battles

### 1. Bankroll Management

Never ever have fun with cash you can not manage to lose. Set a strict budget for a session. If a player deposits £ 50, they need to break that down into smaller increments (e.g., £ 5 battles) rather than going all-in on a single high-roller lobby.



### 2. Studying Case Composition

- **High-Volatility Cases:** Contain very expensive knives or gloves, but the odds of striking them are minuscule.

### 3. Choosing the Right Lobby Size

- **1v1 Matches:** Offer a cleaner 50/50 statistical probability (overlooking house edge). They are fantastic for fast, uncomplicated sessions.
- **FFA (Free-For-All):** Lower win rate (e.g., 25% in a 4-player lobby), but the payouts are massive if you protect the success. Get in these just when feeling fortunate or playing with disposable profit.
