- **Nonce:** A number that increases by one with every round played.

By integrating these components utilizing cryptographic hash functions (like SHA-256), the game creates a crash point. When the round concludes, the server seed [Visit this page](#) is revealed, and gamers can utilize online verifiers to inspect that the house did not cheat.
