Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no visible scratches or use. Normally commands the greatest cost.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Minor imperfections, slight scratches, or minor paint cracking, often just noticeable upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and noteworthy paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Very used, greatly faded, and often dramatically modified look. Some collectors particularly look for severe BS floats for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins also feature a **StatTrak**™ innovation module, which tracks the variety of kills a gamer gets with that specific weapon, including a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in lots of other modern-day video games, CS2 skins possess real-world monetary worth due to the fact that they are totally tradeable and marketable. Gamers can buy, sell, and trade products via the Steam Community Market or through respectable third-party marketplaces using real currency or cryptocurrencies.

A number of elements dictate the rate of a CS2 skin:

1. **Rarity:** Classified by color tiers-- Consumer (white), Industrial (light blue), Mil-Spec (dark blue), Restricted (purple), Classified (pink), Covert (red), and Extra-Ordinary (gold/yellow for knives and gloves).
