Edge Lighting

Edge lighting embeds LEDs along the perimeter of the mirror's glass. This technique produces a crisp, clean line of light outlining the mirror shape, often paired with frosted glass edges to diffuse light. It's a great option when you want to highlight a simple rectangular or oval mirror shape without overwhelming the wall behind.

Because the light is concentrated on the mirror's edges, the wall surface receives less direct wash, making edge lighting ideal for highly patterned tile or textured walls where you want to avoid extra shadows or glare.

In-Glass Light Lines

For a more contemporary effect, some LED mirrors feature decorative light lines embedded within the glass itself. These lines can be geometric, linear, or even abstract patterns that glow as part of the mirror's illumination.
