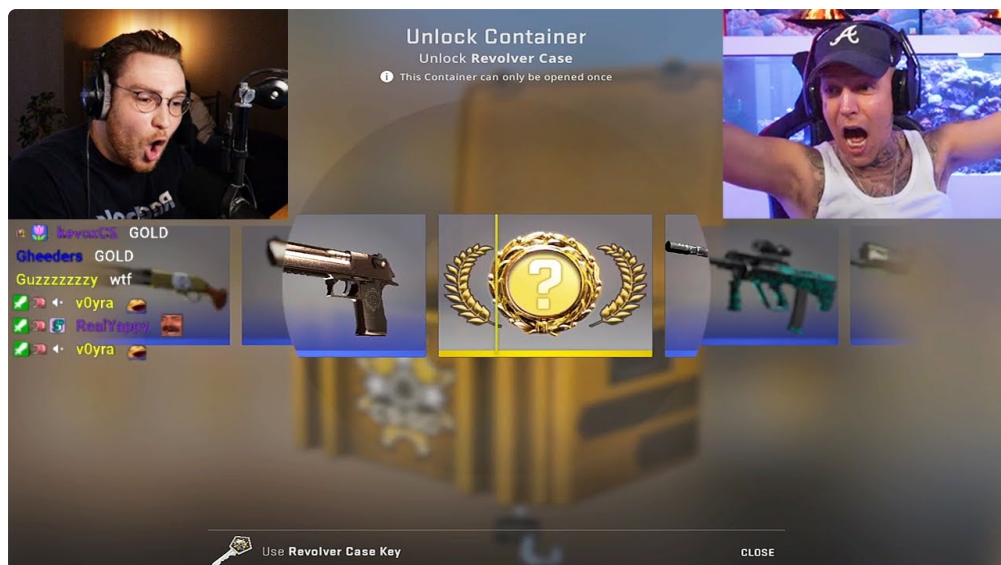

- **Group Battles (2v2 or Team Play):** Players collaborate. The combined worth of the team's drops is compared against the opposing team.
