1. The Sticking Door

Humidity changes typically trigger wood doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Additionally, loose hinge screws can trigger the door to droop.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes are stripped, eliminate the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, locate the binding point by sliding a paper along the space.
- **Step 3:** Sand or airplane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to prevent moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy repair that yields instantaneous gratification.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and location a wedge underneath it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin up using a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Step 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, apply a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- avoid cooking oils that draw in dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door stops working to stay shut, the latch bolt is most likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Action 1:** Apply lipstick to the latch bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, revealing where the lock is striking.
- **Step 2:** Adjust the strike plate by unscrewing it and filing down the hole, or moving it a little up or down to align with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are essential for ventilation and natural light, but they are likewise main culprits for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts suggest abject weatherstripping or stopped working caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the exterior perimeter of the window. If the old caulk is broken or missing out on, scrape it away, clean the location, and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, replace worn-out V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to develop a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint accumulation or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.



- **Step 1:** Run an energy knife thoroughly around the boundary of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Action 2:** Tap gently along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen up the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and use a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window slide efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the two panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has stopped working. Unfortunately, this generally requires replacing the glass unit (IGU) rather than the entire **Window And Door Repair** window frame.
