The Mathematics Behind Knife Openings

Human psychology typically fights with likelihood, which is why case openings remain so attractive. A player may open 50 cases, stop working to get a knife, and presume they are "due" for a win. In truth, the chances never ever change. Each time a secret is used, the chance of seeing gold remains locked at roughly **0.26%**.
