How to Acquire CS2 Case Keys

For players wanting to dive into unboxing, there are two primary approaches to get secrets, each with unique benefits and drawbacks.

- **In-Game Store (Direct Purchase)**
 - *Cost:* ~ £ 2.50 GBP (varies slightly by regional currency).
 - *Pros:* Always readily available, straight from Valve, entirely safe.
 - *Cons:* Non-tradable and non-marketable.
- **Steam Community Market (Older/Specific Keys)**

Older, terminated operation secrets (such as keys from Operation Bravo or Winter Offensive) are no longer offered by Valve in-game. Due to the fact that of their deficiency and collector status, they trade at a premium on third-party marketplaces and the Steam Community Market.
