Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

Do I require to own the video game to play case battles?

A lot of third-party sites only require you to have a Steam account with a linked inventory and a particular Steam Level to prevent bot accounts. However, you normally need a functioning Steam trade URL to receive your jackpots.
