Once purchased, players can trade or offer their skins on the Steam Community Market. Costs are determined completely by supply and demand:

- **High Demand, Low Supply:** Skins that look incredible or belong to popular creators can escalate in value.
- **Low Demand, High Supply:** Over-printed or unpopular skins typically cost simply a couple of cents.

Some uncommon and discontinued skins have attained legendary status, with single items trading for hundreds-- or even thousands-- of dollars.

Popular Skin Categories in Rust

Gamers typically classify their skins based on utility, visual styles, or rarity. Understanding these classifications helps gamers curate a cohesive stock.

1. Camouflage (Cammo) Skins
