What Are Car Transportation Services?

Car transportation services move vehicles from one location to another using specialized carriers. Depending on the customer's needs, a company may arrange open transport, enclosed shipping, door-to-door service, terminal delivery, expedited transportation, or specialty vehicle handling.

These services may be used for:

- Household relocations.
- Military transfers.
- College student vehicle shipping.
- Online vehicle purchases.
- Dealership and auction transportation.
- Fleet and business vehicle movement.
- Classic and collector vehicle shipping.
- Luxury and exotic vehicle transportation.
- Inoperable vehicle transport.

Instead of driving the vehicle yourself, you arrange for a carrier to collect it, transport it along a planned route, and deliver it to the destination. A professional transportation company helps coordinate the shipment and explains the customer's responsibilities.

How Car Shipping Costs Are Calculated

There is no single price for every vehicle shipment. The total cost depends on several factors related to the vehicle, route, timing, equipment, and delivery requirements.

Distance

The distance between Lubbock and the destination is one of the most important pricing factors. Longer routes generally require more fuel, driver time, and carrier operating expenses. However, the cost per mile may vary depending on route demand and carrier availability.

A popular route with frequent carrier traffic may be priced differently from a remote route that requires a carrier to travel farther between shipments.

Vehicle Size and Weight

Larger vehicles take up more trailer space and may increase operating costs. A compact car, full-size SUV, heavy-duty truck, and modified pickup may each receive different estimates.

Tell the shipper if the vehicle has:

- Oversized tires.
- A lift kit.
- A lowered suspension.
- A camper shell.
- A roof rack or cargo box.
- Custom bumpers.
- Wide body modifications.
- Other accessories that change its dimensions.

Open or Enclosed Transport

Open transportation is usually the more economical option because open carriers can transport several vehicles at once and are widely available. Enclosed shipping generally costs more because the vehicle travels inside a covered trailer with limited capacity and specialized handling.

Vehicle Condition

An operational vehicle can usually be driven onto and off the carrier. An inoperable vehicle may require a winch, lift gate, forklift, or other equipment. Because loading and unloading require additional labor and tools, non-running vehicles may cost more to transport.

Pickup and Delivery Accessibility

Large carriers need enough space to approach and maneuver. Narrow streets, gated communities, steep driveways, low-clearance areas, construction zones, and restricted commercial locations may require a nearby meeting point or special arrangements.

Seasonal Demand

Vehicle shipping demand can change throughout the year. Moving seasons, holidays, college schedules, weather conditions, and regional travel patterns may affect carrier availability and pricing.

Shipping Speed

Standard transportation may use the carrier's regular route schedule. Expedited service may be available for customers with strict deadlines, although it can cost more because the company may need to prioritize the shipment or locate a carrier more quickly.

Comparing prices is important, but the lowest quote is not always the best value. An unusually low estimate may omit fees, reflect limited carrier availability, or change after booking.

Ask whether the estimate includes:

- Carrier transportation fees.

- Door-to-door or terminal service.
- Fees for non-running vehicles.
- Potential storage or rebooking charges.

Open Car Transportation

Open transport is one of the most common shipping options for vehicles in Lubbock and across the country. Cars are loaded onto an open trailer that typically carries multiple vehicles.

Open transport may be suitable for:

- Standard cars and sedans.
- Family SUVs and crossovers.
- Pickup trucks.
- Dealer inventory.
- Vehicles purchased through online marketplaces.
- Cars being moved during a residential relocation.

Open carriers are common on many routes, which can provide scheduling flexibility. Vehicles are exposed to normal outdoor conditions such as wind, rain, dust, and road debris. Customers should review the carrier's inspection and insurance procedures before booking.

Enclosed Car Transportation

Enclosed transport places vehicles inside a covered trailer. This option provides additional protection from outdoor conditions and may be preferred for vehicles that require extra care.

Enclosed shipping may be appropriate for:

Door-to-Door and Terminal Options

Door-to-Door Transport

Door-to-door transportation generally means the carrier picks up and delivers the vehicle as close as safely possible to the requested addresses. It can be convenient for residential moves and customers who want to limit additional driving.

Direct access is not always possible. A large carrier may not be able to enter a narrow street, gated community, steep driveway, or crowded apartment complex. In those situations, the driver and customer may meet at a nearby accessible location.

Terminal-to-Terminal Transport

Terminal service involves leaving the vehicle at a designated facility for pickup or collecting it from a facility at the destination. This option may help when a customer cannot be present at a residence or when the address is difficult for a carrier to access.

Ask about terminal hours, storage limits, location availability, and additional fees. The customer may need to arrange transportation to or from the terminal.

Expedited Vehicle Shipping

Standard vehicle transport depends on the carrier's route and availability. Expedited service is designed for customers with urgent transportation requirements.

Expedited shipping may be useful when:

- A vehicle must arrive before a job begins.
- A military reporting date is approaching.
- A college semester is about to start.
- A dealership needs inventory quickly.
- A customer has a limited travel window.
- A vehicle purchase requires prompt delivery.

Expedited service may cost more because the company has less time to coordinate a carrier. Customers should ask whether the provider guarantees pickup, delivery, or only a shorter scheduling window.

Shipping Cars, Trucks, and SUVs

Different vehicles require different planning. A standard sedan usually fits common carrier specifications, while large trucks and SUVs may require additional trailer space.

Cars

For a standard car, provide the make, model, year, operating condition, and any modifications. Remove personal items, photograph existing damage, and disclose low clearance or custom wheels.

Pickup Trucks

Truck owners should disclose the bed length, lift height, tire size, camper shell, toolbox, custom bumper, running boards, and other equipment. These features may change the vehicle's dimensions and loading requirements.

SUVs

SUV owners should report roof racks, cargo boxes, lift kits, oversized tires, side steps, and aftermarket accessories. Remove loose items and verify that the carrier can accommodate the vehicle's height and width.

Specialty Vehicle Transportation

Classic, luxury, exotic, restored, and specialty vehicles may need extra protection. Discuss the vehicle's value, ground clearance, paint condition, operating status, and fragile components with the shipper.

Special considerations may include:

- Enclosed transportation.
- Low-clearance loading.
- Winch-assisted loading.
- Special wheel restraints.
- Detailed condition photographs.
- Protection for custom finishes.
- Additional insurance questions.
- Secure storage if delivery is delayed.

If the vehicle has custom bodywork, delicate trim, nonstandard controls, or a unique starting procedure, provide written instructions before pickup.

Inoperable Vehicle Shipping

A vehicle that does not run can still be transported, but the carrier needs advance notice. Loading an inoperable car may require a winch, lift gate, forklift, or other equipment.

Tell the transportation company:



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- Whether the engine starts.

- Whether the vehicle rolls.
- Whether the steering works.
- Whether the brakes operate.
- Whether the tires hold air.
- Whether the battery is charged.
- Whether the vehicle has severe body damage.

Accurate information allows the provider to select a carrier with suitable equipment and prevents loading problems at pickup.

How to Prepare Your Vehicle

Preparing the vehicle correctly can make the shipment more efficient and reduce avoidable risks. Your shipper may provide specific instructions, but the following steps are commonly recommended.

1. Wash the vehicle's exterior so existing damage is visible.
2. Take photographs from the front, rear, both sides, corners, roof, and interior.
3. Remove personal belongings, valuables, electronics, and documents.
4. Remove loose accessories and detachable equipment when appropriate.
5. Fold in mirrors and secure loose components.
6. Leave only the recommended amount of fuel in the tank.
7. Check tire pressure.
8. Make sure the battery is secured.
9. Disable the alarm system.
10. Provide the carrier with all necessary keys.
11. Disclose leaks, mechanical issues, low clearance, or modifications.

Personal items may not be covered by transportation insurance and can shift during transit. Removing them also helps keep the vehicle within expected weight limits.

Vehicle Inspection Before Pickup

Before the vehicle is loaded, the carrier usually conducts an inspection. This inspection records the car's visible condition and creates a reference for delivery.

The driver may document:

- Scratches and paint chips.
- Dents and body damage.
- Cracked glass or lights.
- Wheel and tire condition.
- Missing accessories.
- Fuel level and mileage.
- Mechanical or operating issues.

Review the condition report carefully. Make sure existing imperfections are listed accurately and ask for corrections if something is missing. Take your own photographs and keep them with the transportation documents.

How Vehicles Are Loaded and Secured

Insurance and Documentation
