Valve's Stance and Regulatory Crackdowns

- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent official notices to dozens of prominent skin gambling sites, demanding they shut down operations as they broke the Steam Subscriber Agreement.
- **Trade Hold Updates:** To curb immediate trading and money laundering, Valve presented a compulsory 7-day trade hold on any traded skin. While this temporarily interfered with the gambling market, operators quickly adapted utilizing P2P systems and crypto cash-outs.
- **Legal Scrutiny:** Governments worldwide have actually begun taking notification. Class-action claims, government investigations, and statutory restrictions in numerous nations have forced operators to constantly move domains and legal structures.
