Valve likewise executed trade cooldowns (products traded can not be re-traded for 7 days) to disrupt the fast circulation of skins used in gambling networks.

However, the ecosystem [CS2 gambling real money](#) is resilient. When one site closes, a number of others emerge, frequently utilizing cryptocurrency intermediaries to bypass direct Steam inventory transfers.

Best Practices and Safety Tips
