3. Caulk Gaps Around Frames

Exterior spaces let water leak into walls, causing structural damage.

- **How to fix:** Scrape away old, broken exterior caulk. Apply a bead of state-of-the-art, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a wet finger or caulking tool.

4. Adjust Door Hinges

Drooping doors normally have loose screws or a hinge that requires stress adjustment.

- **How to repair:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are removed, eliminate the screw, place a small piece of wood toothpick covered in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
