As highlighted above, the home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) dictates when a crash happens. A round can crash instantly at 1.00 x, ruining anyone who did not react in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates in a different way than fiat currency. To many gamers, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less concrete than a £ 300 bill in their physical wallet.
