- **Long or Difficult Moves Within the Local Range:** If your move tested the crew's endurance with multiple flights of stairs or long carries, consider tipping toward the higher end.
- **Exceptional Service:** If movers showed extra care, were friendly, punctual, or expedited the move impressively, feel free to be generous.

## When to Tip Less or Skip

- Subpar service, damage to belongings, or unprofessional behavior are valid reasons to reduce or withhold tips.
- Some moving companies explicitly include tips in their pricing or have policies against accepting gratuities. Always check first.

## How to Tip Local Movers — Best Practices

1. **Cash Is King:** If possible, tip in cash directly to each mover at the end of the job. It's immediate and personal.
2. **Divide Evenly:** Make sure each mover gets an equal share to keep things fair.

4. **Remember the Entire Crew:** Don't focus all your tip on the lead mover. The entire team contributes to a smooth move.
