- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and scuffs)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44 (Heavy wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, in some cases funny appearance)

Note: Some skins are "wear-capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly rare and important.

The CS2 Case Economy: Open vs. Buy
