The parts of the job

A proper Christmas light installation covers more ground than most people expect. It starts with a design for the house: what gets outlined, which trees get wrapped, how it looks from the road. Then installation, which is where the ladders stop being your problem. Then maintenance through the season, because a strand will eventually [christmas light installation](#) act up. And then takedown, then off season storage, so nothing comes back into your garage.

Storage matters more than people think

Most homeowners think about the setup and forget the teardown. Takedown and off season storage are part of how they work, which means nothing lives in your attic between seasons.

Residential and commercial Christmas lighting

Home installs are about the front of the house and the yard. Commercial holiday lighting is doing another job: a business wants to look open and be noticed in December. The install schedule is usually the negotiation, because the work has to fit around open hours.

What to agree on before you book

Be clear about which parts of the property are included, because "the front of the house" means two different things to two people. Agree on who owns the lights, because it changes what happens in January. Settle the takedown while you are still talking about the install.

What should be on the page

A quote with one number and no detail is not enough to compare. It should say which parts of the property are included in specific terms: the roof edge, the porch, which trees, which walks. It should say whose lights these are, since that determines where they go after the season. It should say who takes them down and where they are stored between seasons. And it should say what happens if something quits in the middle of December. The realistic version is undramatic. A crew shows up on a scheduled day, the lights go up, and you were at work. After the season the crew returns for the takedown, and nothing lands in your attic.

If you would rather stop repeating this

For anyone who repeats this every season, a permanent system is a fair question to raise. A permanent LED system goes in once along the roofline and stays, does the holiday colors from your phone, and doubles as everyday lighting the other eleven months. EverCrest Lighting does both. What is permanent outdoor lighting?

Permanent outdoor lighting is a fixed LED system installed along a building's roofline, eaves and architectural lines and left in place all year. The LEDs sit in a track that is color matched to the trim, and the system is controlled from a smartphone app. It replaces the seasonal strands that go up and come down each year.

Are the lights noticeable during the day?

The track is color matched to the trim or fascia and mounted tight along the edge of the roofline, so it is designed to stay discreet in daylight and read as part of the house rather than as decoration.

Does EverCrest Lighting install Christmas lights?

Yes. EverCrest Lighting installs Christmas and holiday lighting, and also installs permanent LED systems that handle holiday colors from an app. On traditional holiday lighting, EverCrest Lighting handles takedown at the end of the season and off season storage.
