- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for prolonged streaks of low crashes (e.g., a number of rounds under 1.50 x) and wagering high up on a perceived "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This succumbs to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent occasion).
