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If you live in Columbus, your trees are working harder than they look. A red maple shading a Clintonville bungalow takes lake-effect winds, freeze-thaw cycles, heavy spring rains, and the periodic ice crust that turns branches breakable over night. On the west side, silver maples stretch too close to street wires. In Bexley, mature oaks loom over slate roofings. When something fails, it frequently goes wrong quick. A weak crotch releases in a March storm, a fungi steals the trunk, or a limb drops over the driveway at the worst possible time. 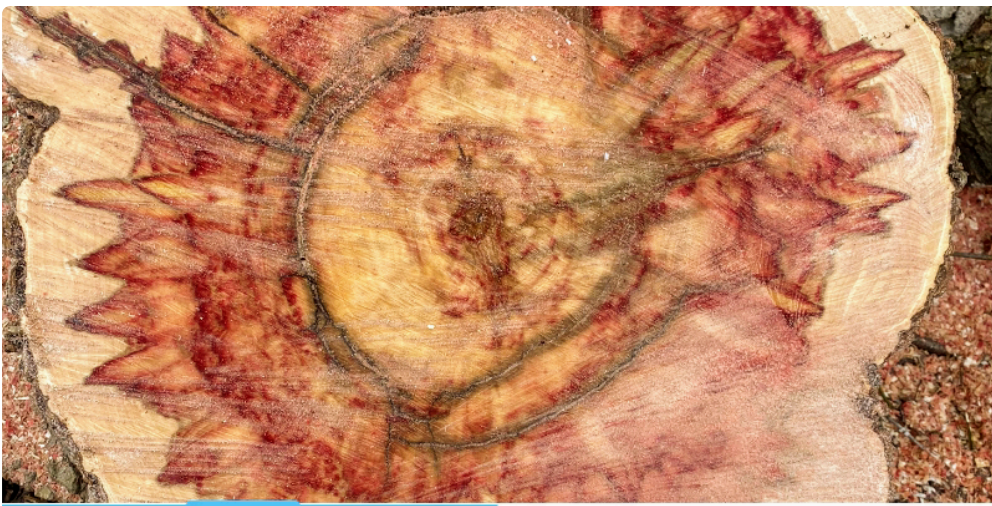
