- **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade ten skins of a specific wear tier for one skin of the next higher tier.

Comprehending Skin Wear and Rarities

Not all skins are developed equal. The visual quality and market price of a skin depend greatly on 2 main factors: **Rarity** and **Wear Condition**.

Weapon Rarities

Rarity determines the baseline drop rate of a skin. Valve utilizes a color-coded tier system to classify products:

Color	Code	Rarity	Tier	Description
Blue	Consumer/ Industrial/ Mil-Spec	The most typical tier. Typically makes up the bulk of random drops and lower-tier case contents.		
Purple	Restricted	Unusual skins with more complex		

designs. **Pink** Classified Unusual skins that are heavily searched for by collectors. **Red** Covert Incredibly uncommon weapons. A lot of renowned rifle skins fall under this classification. **Gold/ Special** Extraordinary The rarest tier, specifically scheduled for knives and unusual glove versions.

Use Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is appointed a floating-point number in between 0.00 and 1.00, known as the **Float Value**. This number identifies how used or scratched the weapon appears.

Wear Condition Drift Value Range Visual Appearance **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful, flawless finish with very little to no scratches. **Minimal Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Slight imperfections or scratches, normally near the edges. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Obvious wear and tear, but the artwork remains mainly undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial scratches and dulling of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavily worn, rusted, or scraped. (Note: Some specific skins look deliberately cool when battle-scarred, earning the label "Blackimov").

The Virtual Economy: Why Are Skins So Expensive?

To an outsider, spending hundreds and even countless dollars on a digital weapon texture seems unreasonable. However, the CS: GO skin economy runs on core economic principles of supply and demand, scarcity, and utility (social status).

Elements Influencing Skin Prices:

1. **Supply and Demand:** If a case is terminated, the supply of its skins stops growing. As the player base broadens, need boosts, driving prices up.
2. **Float and Pattern Templates:** Some skins feature algorithmic patterns. For instance, the *AK-47|Case Hardened* has various quantities of blue coloring depending on its pattern index. A "Blue Gem" pattern can command huge costs.

- **StatTrak™ M4A4|Groan:** Due to a copyright problem, this skin was pulled from drop pools early in its life, making it exceptionally unusual and valuable.
- **Blue Gem Karambit (Case Hardened - Pattern 388):** Rumored to have been valued at over £ 1.5 million, representing among the most pricey digital items in gaming history.
