- **Group/Team Battles:** A 2v2 or 3v3 format where the combined skin worth of a group is compared versus the opposing team.
- **Crazy Mode:** Multipliers and unique occasions are set off arbitrarily, adding an aspect of disorderly luck to the result.

- **Play the Math:** Remember that your home usually maintains a percentage edge over the long term. Treat wins as a benefit instead of an anticipated income source.
