Even with a Provably Fair system, a home edge is baked into the mechanics. The most common method this is executed is through the **immediate crash (1.00 x)**. Usually, a specific percentage of rounds will crash instantly at 1.00 x, indicating all active gamers lose immediately before they even have an opportunity to click cash out.

Popular Strategies Used on Crash Sites

While no strategy can get rid of the mathematical home edge, players regularly use various wagering systems to handle their bankroll and dictate their gameplay style.

- **The Low-Multiplier Auto-Cashout:** Players set an automated cashout at an extremely low multiplier, such as 1.01 x to 1.10 x. While this yields regular, little wins, a single 1.00 x crash can clean out lots of incremental success.
- **The Martingale System:** A traditional progressive wagering method where a player doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recuperate all previous losses plus a profit when they finally win. This needs a massive bankroll and typically hits table or site limits during a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* rather than a loss, attempting to take advantage of winning streaks while decreasing damage during cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for prolonged streaks of low crashes (e.g., several rounds under 1.50 x) and wagering high up on a viewed "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This comes down with the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent event).
