

Bayport has a way of surprising people who arrive expecting a quiet Suffolk County hamlet and leave with a mental map full of marinas, old lanes, local storefronts, and salt air memories. It sits in that part of Long Island where the landscape still feels lived in rather than staged, where you can spend a morning looking at restored historic homes, an afternoon near the water, and an evening driving a few minutes for dinner without feeling like you've crossed into a different town entirely.
