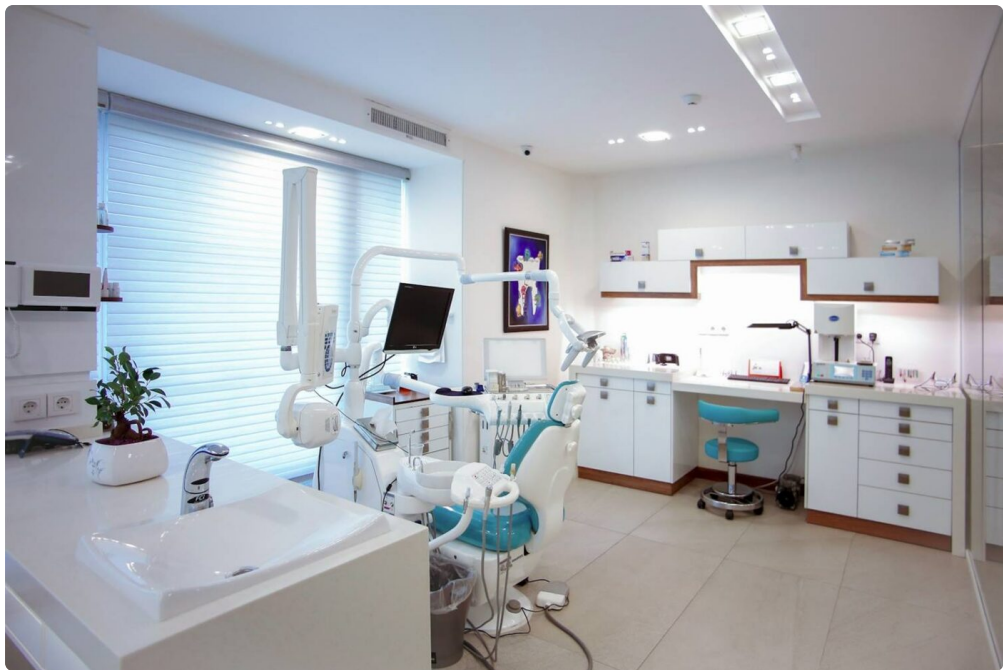

They begin quietly, with a little inflammation at the gumline, a tiny weak spot in enamel, a habit of clenching at night, or a filling that starts to break down long before it fails completely. It becomes a matter of stabilizing a chronic condition and trying to preserve support that has already been lost.

A dentist is trained to detect what symptoms alone cannot tell you. That includes the difference between a stain and decay, soreness from temporary irritation versus infection, and harmless wear versus damage that is likely to worsen without intervention.

Bone loss can progress under otherwise normal-looking gums. Infections at the tip of a tooth root may be discovered before they cause obvious swelling.
