4. Valve's Crackdowns

The company has actually provided widespread cease-and-desist letters to popular gambling operators, withdrawn API keys utilized by automated betting bots, and carried out trade cooldowns (e.g., requiring traded items to remain in a stock for seven days) to interfere with the fluid motion of gambling assets.
