Note: Exact chances can vary from case to case; some newer cases change likelihoods somewhat to reflect market need.

3. Is it possible to make a revenue by opening cases?

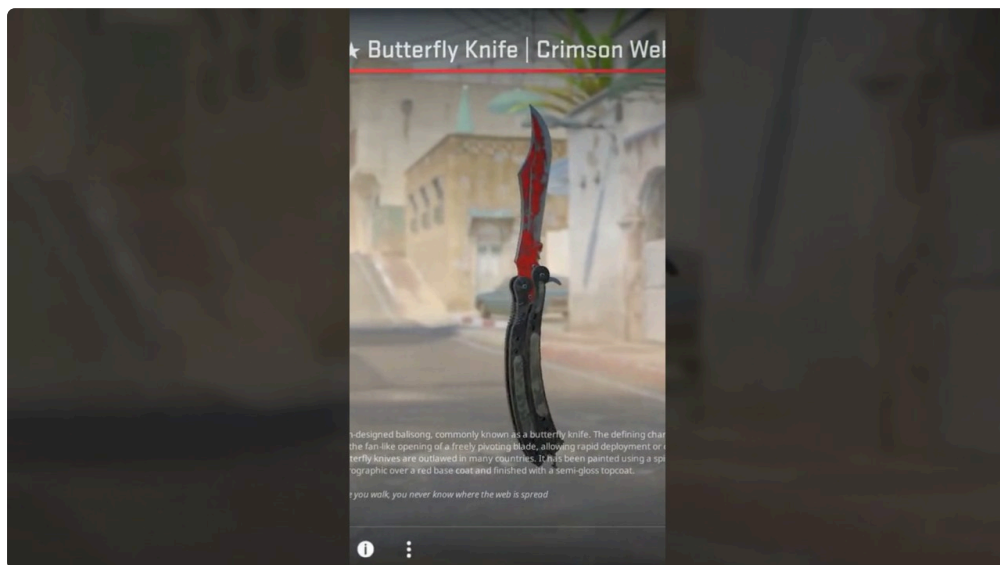
Statistically, the typical return is lower than the expense of the case and essential combined. The majority of gamers lose cash; only a small minority recoup their investment by selling uncommon skins.
