3. The Low Multiplier Auto-Cashout

- **How it works:** Players set an automated cash-out at an extremely low multiplier, such as 1.05 x to 1.10 x.
- **The Catch:** While you will win the huge bulk of rounds, a single unexpected 1.00 x crash (which happens periodically) will eliminate dozens of little wins quickly.
