Understanding Rarity Tiers

Valve classifies skins into distinct rarity tiers, which determine how often they drop or are unboxed from cases. Knowing these tiers is vital for comprehending a skin's baseline value.

Beyond these standard tiers, weapon finishes also include **StatTrak**™ technology (which tracks the variety of eliminates made with that specific weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** versions (dropped during official esports tournaments).

Wear Conditions and Float Values

A significant aspect in a skin's look and rate is its **Wear Condition**, frequently described as the float worth. The float worth is a decimal number varying from **0.00 to 1.00** that identifies how scratched, worn, or faded a texture appears.

The five official wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks beautiful, though some skins can still have small scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight signs of wear, generally minor scratches on the publication or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, but the total art work stays undamaged. This is the most typical condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with big portions of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily damaged. Some skins go through enormous visual changes at this stage, in some cases looking totally rusted or weathered.

Note: Certain skins are "float-capped," suggesting they can not exist in specific conditions. For example, a specific skin may be topped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition offered.

The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The marketplace surrounding these virtual products is frequently studied by economic experts and monetary analysts. Because Valve enables peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins operate likewise to stocks or rare art. Numerous key motorists determine skin costs:

- **Supply and Demand:** If a case is stopped and stops dropping, the supply of its skins freezes while need may continue to rise, increasing rates.
- **Pro Player Influence:** When a famous esports professional uses a particular skin during a major competition, its appeal and price typically rise over night.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next higher tier from the same collection, affecting the flow of high-end products.
- **Stickers and Patches:** Applying rare tournament sticker labels (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can drastically increase its total value, depending on the purchaser.
