- **Step 1:** Your empty dumpster weighs a known "tare" weight.
- **Step 2:** After pickup, the dumpster is weighed on a certified scale full of your debris.
- **Step 3:** The weight difference (gross weight minus tare weight) gives your debris weight.
- **Step 4:** If your debris weight exceeds your limit, the overage charge is calculated at 6 cents per pound based on the exceeded amount.

This method ensures you pay only for what you actually throw away, making it a fair and transparent fee structure.
