- **Create a comprehensive list:** Include every item from large couches, beds, and dressers to smaller boxes and delicate items.
- **Note specialty or high-value items:** Things like pianos, antiques, artwork, or fragile electronics require special handling and might incur additional fees.
- **Photograph valuables:** Documentation helps in insurance and claims if anything happens during transit.

- **Number of flights of stairs:** Moves involving multiple flights require more manpower and time.
- **Availability of elevators or freight lifts:** This can speed up loading/unloading and save money.
- **Parking situation:** Can the moving truck park close? Are permits required? Any parking time limits?

Sharing this accessibility information upfront helps companies like *Southside Moving & Storage* deliver an accurate quote and plan the move accordingly.

3. Clarify the Type of Move: Full-Service vs Basic Transport

Not all moving companies offer the same level of service. Some specialize in **full-service moves** where they pack, load, transport, unload, and even unpack. Others might provide just basic transport — moving your already packed belongings from point A to point B.

- **Full-service moving:** Ideal for busy clients who want everything handled professionally. This often includes packing supplies, disassembly/reassembly of furniture, and even storage.

- **Are you flexible with the moving window?** Companies can often offer better rates if you allow some scheduling leeway.
- **Estimated time for packing:** If you're doing your own packing, how long might it take? Movers coordinate their crews based on your readiness.

Clear timelines help reduce last-minute changes, which are a major annoyance — both for clients and moving companies.

5. Protecting Your Belongings and Home

Safety and protection details are also essential to share during the quote process. Movers want [mynewsgh](#) to know about:

- **Special packing materials needed:** Protective covers, blankets, and crates for fragile or bulky items.
- **Access to utilities:** Is there electricity for disassembly or equipment like dollies?
