- **The Fix:** For painted windows, carefully run an utility knife along the paint seal. For wood windows inflamed by humidity, avoid forcing them; rather, use a silicone-based lube or wait for drier weather condition before planning to airplane down the edges.

Common Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors take a whipping from constant opening, closing, slamming, and moving structures.

1. Sticking or Sagging Doors

A door that drags on the flooring or declines to latch appropriately normally has loose hinges or has actually moved in addition to the home's foundation.
