- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent formal notifications to lots of prominent gambling sites, demanding they stop using Steam's OpenID API for industrial gambling functions. This resulted in a huge wave of site closures.
- **Trade Hold Penalties:** To suppress immediate skin trading used by gambling websites, Valve introduced a seven-day trade hang on any item traded between accounts. This considerably interrupted the instant-deposit design.
- **Ongoing Enforcement:** Valve routinely prohibits bots related to known gambling platforms, leading to the confiscation of countless dollars in virtual products held by those bots.

Despite these steps, the market has actually adapted by using cryptocurrency deposits, peer-to-peer trading systems, and moving domains to bypass blocks.
