1. The Sticking Door

- **Action 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, eliminate the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by moving a piece of paper along the gap.
- **Action 3:** Sand or airplane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy repair that yields pleasure principle.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and place a wedge beneath it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin up utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Action 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, use a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- avoid cooking oils that bring in dust), and tap the pin back into location.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to remain shut, the latch bolt is most likely missing the strike plate.

- **Step 1:** Apply lipstick to the lock bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, revealing where the latch is striking.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by loosening it and filing down the hole, or moving it somewhat up or to line up with the mark.

Typical Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are important for ventilation and natural light, but they are also primary offenders for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts suggest degraded weatherstripping or stopped working caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the outside border of the window. If the old caulk is broken or missing out on, scrape it away, clean the area, and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Step 2:** For double-hung windows, replace damaged V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to develop a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint accumulation or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.

- **Action 1:** Run an utility knife carefully around the boundary of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and use a silicone-based lubricant to help the window move smoothly.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has failed. Unfortunately, this typically requires changing the glass unit (IGU) instead of the entire window frame.
