

Knoxville rewards the kind of attention that notice takes. Walk a few blocks downtown and you can see old brick, limestone, painted storefronts, and weathered sidewalks all sitting within easy reach of newer glass, student foot traffic, and the kind of river air that shifts the mood of a neighborhood by the hour.
